Showing Up for Each Other

As we start a new year, we might have pondered resolutions and how we want to live our life in 2023. A Year In Perspective & Hope For What's Ahead - New Years Eve special video from Affirming Connections is a conversation about the challenges and opportunities of 2023. Hopeful messages presented included using technology and social media to reach out to the larger

community to broaden perspectives and faith, how LBGTQ+ perspective opens blessing of faithful living, and individuals making active choices to attend denominations with shrinking attendance as a demonstration of conscious alignment, authenticity, and faithfulness.

Significantly, a reoccurring theme in the video was the increase in misinformation and bullying being experienced against the LBGTQ+ community. In August of 2022, **Statistics**

Canada released <u>Police-reported crime statistics in Canada, 2021</u>. According to the report, hate crimes have increased by 72% since 2019 (p.14). Statistics highlighted "police-reported hate crimes targeting religion (+354 incidents, +67%) and sexual orientation (+165 incidents, +64%), and to a lesser extent race or ethnicity (+104 incidents, +6%)". "The 423 hate crimes targeting sexual orientation rose above the previous peak of 265 in 2019." It is estimated that only one in five hate crimes are ever reported to police.

One individual in the Affirming Connections' video shared his experience of "surface-level acceptance" in his faith community of origin prior to joining the United Church, which might cause us to reflect on a corporate and personal level about how to be "upstanders" — taking action against prejudice and hate.



Sending People to School—Together (Patti Talbot's Work) When children can't go to school, society suffers

How do you make the world a better place? You can start by taking kids to school.

Around the world, 57 million children cannot attend school.* They may never learn to read, to add or subtract, or to write. These are the skills they need to succeed. Even more importantly, they never learn about their basic human rights.

It's a complicated problem, says Patti Talbot, the United Church's Global Partnership Team Leader. "The work we do isn't going to lead to immediate societal change," she says, "but it will make a big difference down the road."

When children can't go to school, society suffers. And that is why Mission & Service is in partnership with 85 organizations that work to increase access to education across the globe. Each partner has their own approach to education and skills training, each supported by your gifts to <u>Mission & Service</u>.

Colombia's Center for Communication uses arts and media to teach children about their rights. Women for Change in Zambia creates educational groups where participants share agricultural knowledge and awareness of their rights. At Japan's Asian Rural Institute, local leaders gather to learn sustainable agriculture techniques they can take home and transform their communities. "How can we make the world a better place?" asks Talbot before responding, "We can't do that by ourselves; our partners know best what the challenges are."

Talbot, a child of missionaries who was raised in Japan and Korea, knows that educational partnerships are critical. "In our partnerships, we learn from and teach each other," she says. "The United Church's focus is more than just sharing resources, but really sharing life together." It's an approach that Talbot knows works, even if results take time. "Our partners are very grateful that the United Church of Canada has demonstrated over and over again that we are there for the long term," Talbot says.

"Partners say to us 'It makes such a difference to us to know that the United Church is with us, walking with us in prayer, supporting us, remembering us in their lives.""
