

Trinity United Church Brandon AGM Sunday, February 26th, 2023 Following worship ~ Everyone Welcome!

The celebration of February as Black History (or African Heritage) Month Officially recognized in Canada since 1996, this is a time to honour the contributions and struggles of peoples of African descent.

Jonisha Sewinson reflects on Black History Month and the diversity of Blackness I have a bit of a love/hate relationship with Black History Month. I love that it provides space for Black people to express their culture and highlight important (and many times, tragic) events in their history. Though, on the other hand, I also recognize that it is viewed as the only time Black people are relevant in society. Many see Black History Month as the one and only time issues and experiences pertaining to Black people should be discussed. When people participate in Black History Month, they often times see it as an "out" on acknowledging Black topics throughout the rest of the year.

The first time I was introduced to Black History Month was in middle school when my guidance counsellor (who was Black) asked me to participate in the school assembly. I knew the only reason she asked me was because I was Black, as there were only a few of us at the school. She wanted us to "represent our own." Around the same time I was asked to present, I was struggling with my identity as a Black person. While both of my parents are Black, they grew up in England, meaning that many aspects of their culture resembled that of Europeans. So, while helping out with the assembly, my mind was opened to a new definition of what it meant to be Black. As I learned about the history and traditions of different Black people around the world, I found it more difficult to classify myself as the same thing. How could I be black if I didn't eat Jamaican food? How could I be Black if I didn't listen to R&B music. How could I be Black if I didn't understand Patois? All of these questions churned in my head as I tried to pinpoint what "being Black" really meant.

Fast forward to high school, my identity issues became more complicated. I went from a school where I was the only Black girl student in the grade to being one of many Black people in the same class. At first, I was excited that I'd finally have people I could connect with on a deeper level, though I quickly realized that wasn't the case. Being very European in nature, many of my Black peers didn't recognize me as Black. On many occasions people would say, "Jonisha, you're a White person in a Black person's body," or something along those lines. In the beginning, I'd laugh their comments away, though as time passed, their words started to affect me more, and I genuinely questioned my identity. Honestly, I still do at times.

I wish those around me, even the Black people, were educated on the robust history of Black people. I wish it was emphasized that "Black" really is just a skin tone, though society (and the effects colonization) has associated "Blackness" with specific traits. Society has created a staple definition of what a Black person is and has deemed anyone who lies outside of that definition as an outcast. We see this all the time when it comes to biracial people who grow up in environments where they are not accepted by either of their racial identity communities, which honestly, is a whole other conversation.

For the longest time, I hated being Black, and that was mostly to do with the fact that I never saw myself represented in the places that I wanted to be in. All throughout school I was fed the narrative that Canada is one of the most diverse and accepting places on the planet. Yet, when I opened my textbook, I rarely ever saw any Black people (or other people of colour) in it. How can a nation preach diversity when they refuse to acknowledge the diversity of their country?

It's not enough to have Black History Month. People use Black History Month as a way to avoid the real problems that effect Black people. While Black history month is a great tool for amplifying the voices of Black people, it is not enough to change the way the world views Black people. Western society has conditioned us to believe that White is the default. And when we truly believe that, everything that people of colour contribute to the world is either taken for granted, stolen, or eradicated.

As much as I wish there wasn't a need for Black History Month, I appreciate the fact that it allows Black people to speak freely about their story, their history, unapologetically. I'm tired of hearing my truth being told through someone else's eyes.

It took a while, but now I'm ready. So, hand me the mic. I got a lot to say.

Jonisha has always had an interest in social justice and participated in the Young Black Scholars Program and developed the United Church's Anti-Racism Training for Youth (ages 13-18) curriculum.

On Christmas Eve 2022 in Buffalo, New York, Sha'Kyra Aughtry heard someone outside screaming for help in the midst of a blizzard.

Aughtry and her boyfriend, Trent Alls, brought the developmentally disabled man, 64-year-old Joe White, Into their home to warm up -- but Aughtry feared it was too late. White was covered in frostbite. The couple fed White, gave him a warm bath and tried to treat his frostbite. Due to the blizzard, emergency

responders were unable to respond to her calls. In a desperate plea for help, Aughtry took to Facebook Live.

A group of good Samaritans saw her Facebook post and helped transport White to the hospital where he is still recovering after nearly all of his fingers were amputated. Because of what Aughtry and Alls did, the NFL gifted them two tickets to the Super Bowl last Sunday in Arizona. Delta Airlines will fly them there.

Aughtry and Alls' kids also got a surprise: a free four-day vacation for their first-ever trip to Disney

Elders teach students the words, phrases, songs, and stories of their ancestors.

Take a moment to think about your favourite story.

Now imagine that story being at risk of disappearing because the language it's written in is endangered. This is something that nine Elders from Haida Gwaii are passionately trying to change.

Once there were over 15,000 fluent speakers of Haida, but today, because of assimilation tactics like residential schools, almost all Haida people speak English at home. The nine Elders—with an average age of more than 80—represent about half of the fluent Haida speakers who remain. With partner support, the work of these Elders in a research-based revitalization project keeps the Haida language alive and growing.

The Elders are teaching students the words, phrases, songs and stories of their ancestors. The response has been empowering, with language learners near and far dedicating themselves to study. Lessons are given through the Longhouse of Skidegate village, but the program reaches much further, with more than 120 online lessons available. The opportunity to connect across the globe has allowed Haida language, stories, and culture to be shared broadly.

The program also gives young people from the Haida Nation the opportunity to connect with the Elders to nurture their cultural pride and understanding. "I appreciate the work the Elders are doing with our language and culture," said one young student.

"They work very hard every day so that my generation can remember."

The Haida language is not the only Indigenous language that has been endangered. Your gifts to <u>Mission & Service</u> support programs and partnerships for Indigenous cultural revitalization around the world.
