#### Affirming Vision, Trinity United Church, Brandon, MB

At Trinity United Church our Vision is to Grow in Faith, Fellowship and Service Through Christ Jesus. worship and full participation in all aspects of our ministry. As a congregation we are committed to surroundings that reflect safety and support in respect of social justice and human rights.

### Elevator – Out of Order! Update

You don't fully appreciate something until you lose it – and we've really felt the loss of our church elevator that provides access for our mobility challenged friends to all levels of our facility. The board's first decision was very easy, "Yes, we need a functioning elevator."



To try to manage without is not an acceptable option.

We then solicited Brandon Elevator to provide us with some initial quotes. To repair and bring our current system up to code was \$22,000. Brandon Elevator discouraged this choice because it is a band aid solution on a 27-year-old lift that is no longer technically supported by its provider.

They also quoted \$54,000 for a new two-level (basement/main floor) lift and \$69,000 for one that would access all three levels like our current elevator. The board is currently leaning toward the all-level solution but has requested more information on the quoted device and is procuring a quote from another provider.

Making the decision to buy a new elevator is easier than coming up with a way to pay for it. We've received a few donations and raised \$1,000 with the pancake breakfast on June 11. We have \$20,000 in our Memorial fund which is appropriate for projects like this but \$69,000 is no small amount and much more fundraising is planned. As well, grants have been searched out.

People have asked, "What about all that money we received from Central?"

The board chose to invest the Central funds to generate interest to help balance the budget. In our ministry sharing agreement with Alexander, we received almost \$8,000 per year toward the minister's costs. With them leaving the agreement this year, the board determined that interest from the Central donation almost covers this shortfall. We could liquidate investments to pay for the elevator, but this would impact our ability to balance the budget and our long-term sustainability. The best outcome for our church's financial situation is to raise as much money as possible for the new elevator.

- We reached out to Otis and completed an application for a quote. Eden followed up a number of times and there has been no response.
- Brandon Elevator was contacted early last week asking for a meeting to get more information but also no response.

# What certain NHL players don't understand about homosexuality and the Bible

OPINION: Goalie James Reimer refused to wear a Pride-themed jersey, citing his faith. But what do the Scriptures actually say?

Hockey stories don't often break out of the sports pages, but that's certainly not the case this week. San Jose Sharks goalie, Manitoba-born James Reimer, decided not to participate in the warmups before Saturday's game against the New York Islanders. The reason? His teammates were wearing Pride-themed jerseys to show support for the LGBTQ community, and Reimer believes that this would be contrary to his Christian beliefs.

He has "always strived to treat everyone with respect," he said in a statement, but "[in] this specific instance, I am choosing not to endorse something that is counter to my personal convictions, which are based on the Bible, the highest authority in life."

Reimer isn't the first professional hockey player to speak out on the subject. In January, the

Philadelphia Flyers' Ivan Provorov also refused to wear a similar warm-up jersey, arguing that he had "to stay true to myself and my religion." That same month, the New York Rangers decided not to wear Pride jerseys or use Pride tape, after earlier announcing that they would do so.

Within the sporting world, the issue isn't confined to hockey — back in 2019, the Australian rugby player Israel Folau went much further, posting that gay people were destined for hell. He was banned from the national team.

But it's less about sport or James Reimer than it is about Christian inconsistency and homophobia. All of these stars play on Sundays. I'm sure they mix different fabrics in their uniforms and streetwear. They don't keep kosher, and they ignore — quite rightly —

"What certain NHL Players" continued many of the other Mosaic laws contained in the first five books of the Old Testament. I mention this because most of the alleged prohibitions against samesex relationships are to be found in texts that also outline any number of restrictions that were abandoned centuries ago by Christians.

The fact is that the Bible is ambiguous about homosexuality — a word not actually coined until the late 19th century. The Genesis story of Sodom and Gomorrah is a particular favourite, yet Sodom isn't really about the issue at all, and Lot, one of its heroes, offers the mob his two virgin daughters in place of his male guest. Hardly family values!

Ezekiel says, "This was the guilt of your sister Sodom: she and her daughters had pride, excess of food, and prosperous ease, but did not aid the poor and needy. They were haughty and did abominable things before me." It wasn't until the 11th century that the papacy insisted that the story was about sex.

When the Old Testament does deal with the subject, it refers to the need to procreate so as to preserve the people — it's the same reason that masturbation was condemned. Also, when God creates humanity, the word "Adam" is used, and, in Hebrew, it's gender-free and not specifically male. How interesting the Bible is when we look a little deeper.

As a Christian and a priest, I relish the Hebrew scriptures, but they require, if not demand, interpretation. They could be regarded as justifying slavery, ethnic cleansing, and selling one's children into bondage. We can take the Bible seriously or literally, but we can't always do both.


The New Testament, which should be central to the Christian life, says even less about homosexuality. Jesus never mentions it and is much more concerned with those who judge others or are religious pedants. There is, however, one fascinating episode when he's approached by a Roman centurion who deeply loves his servant and wants him healed. Jesus is impressed — and does so.

Two points. First, Jews at the time mocked the Romans as being gay. Second, the Greek used in this exchange describes something much more than platonic love. It could well be that onlookers of the scene and early readers of the story would have assumed this to be Jesus approving of a same-sex romance.

St. Paul does condemn straight men using boys for sex but never comments on loving, committed, same-sex relationships. If we read the text carefully and properly, it appears that he's referring to pagan initiation rituals — and condemning illicit and immoral behaviour in general.

That really is about it. A fringe theme at best and something that Jesus clearly wasn't especially concerned about. There are, however, more than 2,000 references to the poor in the Bible, and Jesus himself speaks throughout the Gospels about social injustice, exclusion, intolerance, inequality, and the dangers of wealth and power. It's almost as if some people are looking at scripture through the wrong end of the telescope.

I don't expect hockey players to be theologians, and I certainly don't believe in screaming at them when they make foolish decisions. But I do wonder who is teaching and guiding them. LGBTQ people are still persecuted in much of the world, still face discrimination even in good old Canada and especially in the United States. Surely, the Christian thing to do is stand — and play — in solidarity.
