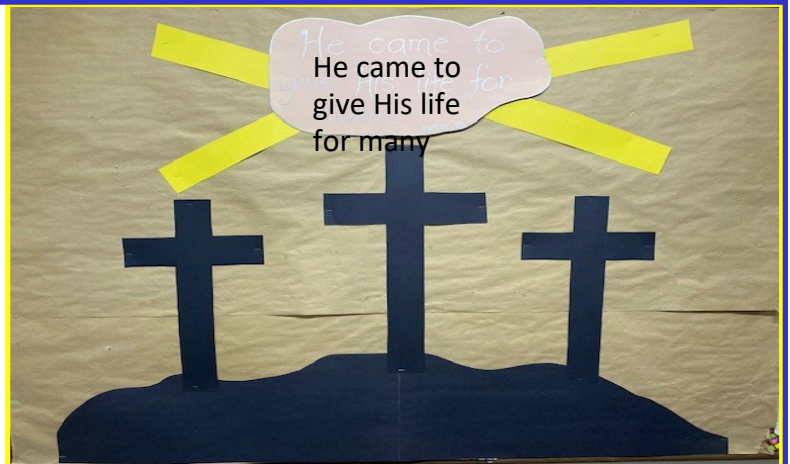
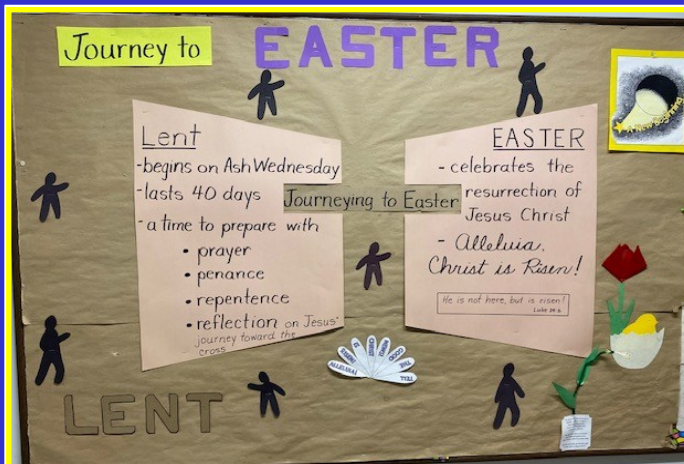

Daniel Romeril, a United States lay minister and local artist, stood on a platform outside Brandon University to preach against nuclear war. The event was organized by the university's student union and the Brandon Chapter of Project Ploughshares, a national peace organization.

History

Helping Hands Soup Kitchen came into existence as a result of a group of individuals taking a life skills course through the John Howard Society. As a part of their reentry into society from the correctional system, they were required to plan an organization that would answer an identified need within the city. They chose a "soup kitchen" as the theme for their exercise. The plan they created came to the attention of a group of Brandon business people, who then raised money and put the plan into operation.

The Helping Hands Centre of Brandon, Inc. opened its doors on January 2, 1990, and on that day served just six meals. Since 1990, there has been a steady growth in the number of guests coming to the Centre. Helping Hands now strives to serve a nutritious, hot, three-course meal five days per week — often to over 175 patrons per day. All of this work is done with the help of two staff persons and a contingent of volunteers.

In June 2024, we updated our logo, tagline, and colours. The logo now incorporates the name "Helping Hands Soup Kitchen" to clearly reflect the service we provide to the community.

How To Be An Active Ally -



Monday, March 24, 2025

I attended this workshop presented by Han from SERC Brandon along with Rev. Doug and Alan Silvius from Trinity and several Knox members. Sexuality Education Resource Centre (SERC) has on-line Ongoing Resources in addition to an extensive library of books that are for all people and age appropriate. Education is something that is necessary to allies of the 2STLGBQIA+ community and very helpful to our community in Brandon. To be an effective ally, we have to be more than a bystander. We have to be willing to put ourselves out there to stand up for what is right. Caveat to that statement is to be certain you can stand up as long as it is safe for you and for those you are standing up for in any situation. Being an ally also means educating yourself in the proper

language, pronouns, and always being kind. Looking back on the history of PRIDE and recognizing the struggles the "Rainbow" community has and continues to endure will help us to understand those within the community. Never assume that you know someone's pronoun. It is okay to ask in a genuine and kind manner so that you do not insult or hurt another person's feelings. Mental health has played a large role in the lives of those within the 2STLGBQIA+ community as dealing with their gender and sexuality which is often different from what society deems "normal" has made their lives more difficult as they are often challenged, harmed, ridiculed, etc. Being an ally means not just paying lip service but educating yourself, standing up, and getting to know members of the 2STLGBTQIA+ community along with being a friend.

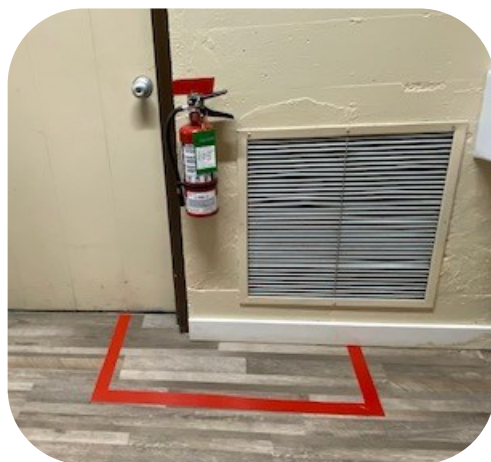

You can never be too safe!!



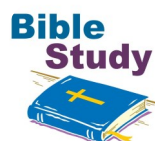

In March we welcomed four new members to Trinity.

Here is # 6. Women have always played active, if undervalued roles in church activities. Methodist women were sometimes allowed to preach prior to union but were never ordained. In 1923, Saskatchewan resident Lydia Gruchy graduated with top honours from Saskatoon's Presbyterian Theological College (now St. Andrew's). She was initially refused ordination but finally, in 1936, became the first woman in the United Church to be ordained. Acceptance of women in ministry was slow but in the 1980s, my congregation had two women ministers. After attending a different congregation on holiday, our two young daughters looked up, wide-eyed, and commented, "We didn't know men could be ministers!" 😊

For our next vignette, she writes:

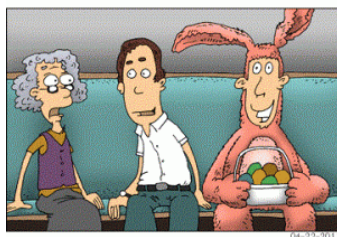
The United Church has been known for its stance on many political issues and a number of ministers have turned to politics. Peter Dawon was serving in ministry in southern Alberta when he won the provincial Little Bow constituency. In 1937, he was named Speaker of the Alberta Legislative Assembly and held that post until his death in 1963. He was the longest-serving Speaker in Alberta history. Ministers elected federally include Stanley Knowles (Winnipeg), Bill Blaikie (Winnipeg), Robert Oliphant (Toronto) and Walter Mclean (Waterloo). Former moderator Lois Wilson was named to the senate by Prime Minister Jean Chretien in 1998.
