#### A devotional taken from. Rev 5:7-14 Our daily Bread Our Father's Treasures

It's just an old pocketknife, worn and tarnished with time. The blade is chipped and the handle notched, but it was one of my father's treasures, kept in a box on his dresser until he gave it to me. "It's one of the few things I have from your grandfather", he told me. My grandfather died when my father was young, and Dad treasured the knife because he treasured his father.

The Bible tell us that God also has an unlikely treasure, something we might not expect. In Revelation, we see a throne in heaven encircled by "four living creatures' and twenty-four elders", bowing before Jesus in worship. Eash one is holding "golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of God's people". In ancient times, incense was something precious, used by kings (think of the gold, frankincense, and myrrh offered to Jesus in Matthew 2:11). Our prayers may not seem like much to us a times, but God wants them lifted before Him always. Revelation 5 emphasizes the worthiness of Jesus because of His sinless life and loving death for us. Jesus' worthiness point s us to why God values our prayers. Our prayers are precious to God because we're precious to Him. Because He loves us with such selfless, priceless, and merciful love, He longs for us to stay close to Him in prayer.

How will you love God with your prayers today? Who and what can you bring before Him in loving prayer?

Loving Saviour, You're worthy "to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honour and glory and praise!" (Rev 5:12)

A friend once asked me "What gets you up in the morning". The truth is My devotional to God. First thing in the morning I grab my Bible, devotional booklet and my journals (complete with stickers). And begin my morning. I draw inspiration from the Bible verses, and write in my journals

My journal entry for Friday, April 4, 2025 Revelation 5:7-14 was as follows

When I thought about verse 5-8, I imagined an angel offering the prayers of all the people (yours and mine) to God, and the smell of the burning incense being pleasing to God

I thought about the importance of remaining close to God through prayer.

Knowing that God likes to hear from me was very encouraging
I also thought about the practice of prayer journals I have never kept one, but I know a lady who got a lot of comfort out of hers.



Equity and diversity include not only our 2SLGBTQIA+ communities, but all people, particularly racialized community members and females who continue to be under represented in our society.

An uplifting story occurred recently when on April 10, 2025, 25-year-old Trechelle Bunn was voted in as Chief of Birdtail Sioux Dakota Nation. She is one of the youngest sitting chiefs in the country and this election marks the first time the community located near the Saskatchewan boundary has elected a female leader. Bunn was born in Minnesota but grew up in the small southeastern Manitoba community of Wampum. She made her mark as a young woman as a hockey player, which afforded her opportunities to play in Minnesota and Boston, then on to the University of Calgary Dinos on scholarship. She transferred back to the University of Manitoba during the Covid-19 pandemic, holds a bachelor's degree majoring in criminology, and has completed her second year of law school. Bunn is a leader at the university helping other Indigenous students and athletes. She has established a half-marathon Reconciliation Run on Sept. 30th, Reconciliation Day, in honour of her great-grandparents Donald and Mildred Bunn, who were students at Birtle Indian Residential School.

Bunn said in an interview, "Something that always kind of motivates me and inspires me is that I may be the first, but I won't be the last. I hope that other young people and other women are inspired by my story and to step into positions of leadership within our communities and across the country."

Many thanks to **Gayle Simonson**, a lay member of the United Church at Southminster Steinhauer in Edmonton, an experienced history researcher, and a writer who has written for historical journals and UCC publications. She is a key volunteer in the United Church archives for both Northern Spirit and Chinook Winds. Here is one of her latest ones: 'Before Union, each denomination had its own printing business to produce news and resources. Ryerson Press, the Methodist church publishing business, boasted "the most completely equipped printing and binding plant in Canada." Its Christian Guardian dated to 1829, The Presbyterian Witness to 1848, and The Congregationalist to 1854. At union they combined to form The New Outlook. In 1938, merged with two other United Church publications, it was renamed the United Church Observer. That name was recently changed to Broadview. It remains the oldest continuously published magazine in North America and the second oldest in the English-speaking world. ' For more stories, please visit:




