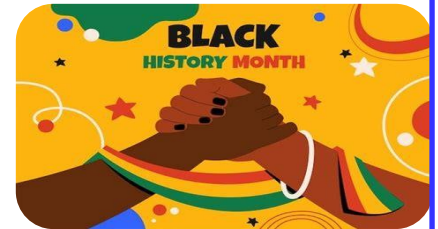

What is the Slave Bible? Who Made it and Why?

Slave owners worried Bible verses about freedom would incite their African slaves to rebel. On the other hand, certain passages of Scripture encouraged submission to authority. Rather than withholding the entire Bible, some masters allowed their slaves to have the Slave Bible, which was compiled from selected parts of God's word to inspire submission



The earliest copy of the Slave Bible was published in 1807, an 'astoundingly reduced Bible which contains only parts of 14 book, Brigit Katz reported for [SmithsonianMag.com](https://www.smithsonianmag.com). Sections that were removed included the Exodus story, which showed God instruction Moses to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt.

The account of Joseph's enslavement, however, remains because his story exemplifies how well behaved submission is rewarded by God. "The Lord was with Joseph, and he was a successful man, and he was in the house of his master the Egyptian". ([Genesis 39:2](https://www.bible.com)).



The *Slave Bible* was published and commissioned "on behalf of the Society for the Conversion of Negro Slaves" for use by missionaries who wanted "to teach enslaved Africans to read, with the ultimate goal of introducing them to [Christianity](https://www.christianity.com)," according to [Katz](https://www.katz.com).

Hymn History ~ Just A Closer Walk With Thee

This hymn is frequently known as a Negro Spiritual or traditional gospel hymn. Just A Closer Walk With Thee became popular after being transcribed by Kenneth Morris in the 1940's. This hymn probably goes back to the slave fields of the south, being kept alive by black churches until it was discovered by composer Kenneth Morris.

Kenneth was travelling by train, when he got out to stretch his legs at a stop and heard a porter singing this tune. Kenneth re-boarded the train, but the tune was still in his head. At the next stop he got off the train and travelled back to the stop where he heard the porter singing the same tune. Kenneth transcribed the lyrics. The hymn quickly became a familiar gospel hymn, frequently sung at funerals and recorded by artists: 'Selah Jubilee Singers' in 1941, 'Tennessee Ernie Ford', 'Ella Fitzgerald' and 'Elvis Presley'.

The early recordings had a soft, "jazzy" feel to them that was not considered appropriate by many churches — but it was kept in the hymnals and became a famous hymn, especially in New Orleans, but by this time the music was played with in a very somber and stately fashion.

A beautiful hymn speaking of our desire for a closer walk with God. The hymn speaks about a world of toil and snares but then the words switch to hope, saying, if I falter Lord who cares, because God is there to share all my burdens and pick me up. The hymn then asks Jesus to stay close and guide us safely to His Kingdom's shore. A very uplifting and beautiful hymn that came out of a horrible time of trouble and hardship.

From Equity & Diversity ~ March 14th is PIE Day



March 14 is PIE Day, and in church circles it has nothing to do with math. “PIE” is short for “public, intentional, and explicit”—the standards we hold ourselves to when we seek to live into being affirming, welcoming, and inclusive people and communities.

PIE Day was co-founded by Affirm United/S’affirmer Ensemble and Affirming Connections. Every year, Affirm United invites the church to celebrate the full inclusion of 2SLGBTQIA+ people in faith communities and beyond. The day also reminds and challenges us to continue widening our welcome to embody love and celebrate gender and sexual diversity in all its forms. It’s critical that we do (United Church of Canada).

In Brandon, Assiniboine Affirm Cluster (Brookdale, Forrest, Knox, Trinity U.C. Faith Communities) are hosting PIE DAY on March 14th at Knox United Church. Rev. David Cathcart will address the community with his Art Talk at 1 PM “Embracing the Wonky Line and Following Happy Accidents: What Art Taught Me About Creating Community”. He will be conducting a Line and Wash Workshop in the morning (limited to 20 participants at <https://form.jotform.com/260355697097066>). Rev. David was ordained to the ministry of word, sacrament and pastoral care in 2003. He served as the first openly gay minister of Knox United Brandon from 2007 to 2012 and was

active in Brandon Pride and the arts community. Knox became an Affirming Ministry during David’s tenure, and he worked with the LGBTQ+ Collective at Brandon University to organize Brandon’s first observance of the Transgender Day of Remembrance in 2008. David currently serves Trinity United Church in Port Coquitlam, BC on the unceded territory of the Coast Salish Peoples, the Kwikwetlem First Nations. PIE Day will host tables from SERC, Westman Empowerment Fund, PFLAG, Brandon Pride, Smitten and 2 libraries: BU-John E. Robbins Library and Brandon Public Library. And of course, there will be many pies to choose from as you enjoy fellowship following Rev. Cathcart’s address. Additionally, there will be a pie auction.

Please join us at Knox United Church March 14th to celebrate full inclusion of everyone in our United Church of Canada.


