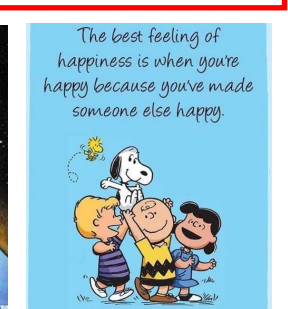
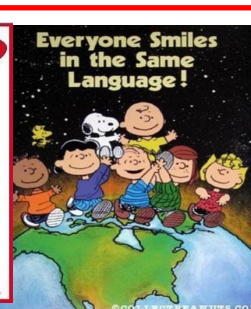
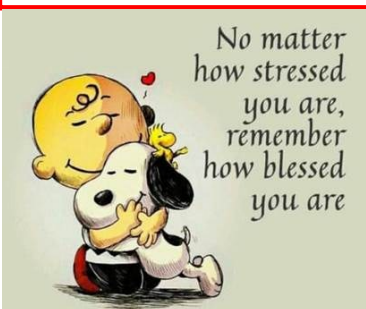

Hymn History ~ Pass Me Not O Gentle Savior

I chose to write about this hymn partly because the lady was a very prolific hymnodist who was born blind. Fanny Crosby was inspired to write this hymn during her prison ministry in New York, when she heard a prisoner's plea, "O Good God, do not pass me by "

William Doan was the composer of this hymn. This hymn was very popular in the African American churches where it is recognized as a profound spiritual prayer.

Recently at Fairview we had the pastor and choir from the RCCG Church in Brandon come for a service.

The pastor shed more light on this hymn in his introduction when he told us this scripture was from Luke 18:35-43 and Blind Bartemaeus, when Jesus stopped and turned to Bartemaeus as he called for him. The pastor made a point of telling us that Jesus would not pass us by either.

It was a very touching and encouraging moment, one I will not soon forget.

As previously mentioned Fanny was a gifted hymnodist, who also wrote: Blessed Assurance, I Am at Thine O Lord, All the Way My Savior Leads me, and Jesus Keep my Near the Cross.

My research did not tell me, if Fanny made a connection to blind Bartimaeus Or to her blindness, and a cry for help-

But I think it is certainly possible. In any case the result is this beautiful hymn.

Strength From Struggle

Romans 5: 1-5

Jess was getting on in years when he first heard the children's folktale about the boy and the butterfly. Right away, he understood the story's lesson on gaining strength from struggle. In the tale, a boy is given a butterfly cocoon but was told not to open it. But as the cocoon slowly twists and shudders in his hand, the boy can't resist using scissors to split it open so the butterfly inside can escape. Freed from the struggle, however, the butterfly falls to the ground and dies without ever flying. "What happened?" the boy cries. Jess, after a long life, understood instantly. "The boy prevented the butterfly from using the muscles needed to grow strong and fly."

The children's lesson may be a fable (although very true), but it affirms the bracing biblical truth taught by Paul to persecuted believers in Jesus in Rome: "We also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope" (Romans 5: 3-4)

Paul wasn't saying to celebrate pain or deny its heartbreak. He confirmed instead that God will use life's troubles to build our character, growing our hope in Him.

It's in His strength that God develops our trust in His overcoming power. The butterfly was cheated from growing stronger to fly. But in Christ, we can rejoice as struggles lift us with character to God our Deliverer.

Yousaf Chaman, Bunyaad Fair Trade Rugs

On Sunday, April 19, Trinity welcomed Yousaf Chaman of Bunyaad Fair Trade Rugs to present the **“Minute for Mission”**. Yusaf’s family began working with artisans in the villages of northern Pakistan in 1982 to continue the long tradition of creating hand-knotted heirloom quality rugs but within the international fair-trade movement. The artisan group includes over 850 families from over 100 villages who are able to remain in their own villages and homes to create the rugs and have access to international markets through fair trade.

Yusaf’s presentation at Trinity focused on the impact that our purchase of fair trade products at Brandon Villages store, specifically the rugs from Bunyaad, have on the artisans in Pakistan. The benefits of the fair-trade system for the villagers include:

- fair wage for their labour, no child labour
- getting paid when rug is completed, not once sold overseas
- allows families to stay at home, work together, look after children at the same time
- they can focus on creativity and quality, rather than speed and quantity
- use of locally-sourced materials such as wool, cotton, silk, plant dyes
- continues the ancient tradition of rug making in a sustainable manner
- supports healthy living, culture and education

In short, when you purchase a fair trade item, you not only acquire a beautiful piece of functional art, be it a rug, carving, pottery or other fair trade product, you also support families, culture, education and sustainable economic activity.

The Fair Trade Rug Event at Ten Thousand Villages Brandon (829 Rosser Ave.) has been extended to May 13, 2026. Items include rugs and runners of various sizes and patterns, cushions, and mug rugs (coasters). Even if you don’t make a purchase, you are welcome to visit the store, appreciate the ancient art of rug-knotting, and learn more about the benefits of fair trade.
